Syllabus for MUS 228-Contemporary Music Theory/ Lead Chart Notation 3 Credit hours Fall 2007

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will present contemporary music theory concepts equipping the student to function within a contemporary musical framework. Prerequisite: Successful completion of Keyboard Skills Improvisation (MUS 210), or Guitar Skills Improvisation (MUS 207). Instrument use fee: \$55.00

This course is designed to acquaint the student with chord symbol notation and contemporary harmonization and theory practices.
