Syllabus for MUS 036-02 - Applied Music (Electric Bass) 2 Credit Hours Fall 2009

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Private, one 50-minute lesson per week to improve student's ability to play the electric bass. Prerequisites: Departmental Approval Applied lesson fee of \$500.00 for non majors.

II. COURSE GOALS

To prepare student for praise and worship or jazz groups and increase musical ability

III. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES FOR THIS COURSE

A. Terminal Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to do the following:

- 1. Show improved ability on the instrument and clarity of tone.
- 2. Exhibit styles of performance, and be able to interpret them.
- 3. Perform in various styles on the electric bass

B. Objectives for Students in Teacher Preparation Programs

The teacher candidate will know how to develop a high standard of performance on the instrument.

The winds and strings teacher candidate will be able to demonstrate the following:

- 1. Musical interpretation within appropriate musical styles and historical accuracy.
- 2. Good stage presence and concert etiquette.
- 3. Good pitch, the control of pitch and tone quality throughout the range of the instrument.
- 4. Appropriate vibrato for strings and certain winds and a variety of articulations, such as legato, staccato, marcato, and multiple tonguing for winds.

All of these objectives are assessed by teachers in the weekly applied lesson. Evaluation is made and suggestions given for correction and improvement. Often written critiques are given to students covering specific assignments. Students (teacher candidates) make constant self-evaluation during regular practice sessions.

Further evaluation is made by teachers and students alike in performances, of which at least one is required each semester. Evaluation in the form of Instrumental Juries are required of all instrumental primaries. Instrumental Faculty sit as a panel to assess student progress for the semester. More extensive evaluation is available for students who qualify and who select to perform a Music Education Recital.

The course Goals for the Teacher Preparation Program meets the "competency-based" requirements established by the Oklahoma Commission on Teacher Preparation. This course meets Subject Competency # 5 Instrumental/General.

Subject Competency:

5. Has mastery of a major instrument, including appropriate techniques of breathing, embouchure (mouth position), posture, and hand position.

Other courses where this competency is being met:

- 1. Instrumental Ensembles uses group instrumental techniques.
- 2. Orchestration, where arranging is done for instrumental and choral groups.
- 3. Music Seminar provides a means by which many skills taught in other music courses are displayed through the recreative process of practical performances.
