# MUS 228-Contemporary Music Theory/ Lead Chart Notation

2 Credit hours Fall 2015

### I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Presents contemporary music theory concepts that equip the student to function within a contemporary musical framework.

Prerequisite: MUS 210 or 207.

Instrument use fee: \$55.

This course is designed to acquaint the student with chord symbol notation and contemporary harmonization and theory practices.

## V. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- A. University Policies and Procedures

- b. Failing to meet group assignment or project requirements while claiming to have done so;
- c. Failing to cite sources used in a paper;
- d. Creating results for experiments, observations, interviews, or projects that were not done;
- e. Receiving or giving unauthorized help on assignments.

By submitting an assignment in any form, the student gives permission for the assignment to be checked for plagiarism, either by submitting the work for electronic verification or by other means. Penalties for any of the above infractions may result in disciplinary action including failing the assignment or failing the course or expulsion from the University, as determined by department and University guidelines.

- 4. Final exams cannot be given before their scheduled times. Students need to check the final exam schedule before planning return flights or other events at the end of the semester.
