Syllabus for

NUR 300—Health Assessment

3 Credit Hours Fall 2020

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduces performance and documentation of a head-to-toe assessment on a healthy adult. Includes concepts related to obtaining a health history on diverse clients.

Prerequisite: PHS 223, PHS 224.

Co-requisites: NUR 230, PNUR 111, 112, 113

II. COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The purpose of this course is to enable the student to do the following:

- A. Demonstrate a head-to-toe physical assessment on a healthy adult.
- B. Utilize precise, professional terminology to document head-to-toe assessment findings.
- C. Describe basic components of a health history for a variety of clients.

V. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A. University Policies and Procedures

- 1. Attendance at each class or laboratory is mandatory at Oral Roberts University. Excessive absences can reduce a student's grade or deny credit for the course.
- 2. Students taking a late exam because of an unauthorized absence are charged a late exam fee.
- 3. Students and faculty at Oral Roberts University must adhere to all laws addressing the ethical use of others' materials, whether it is in the form of print, electronic, video, multimedia, or computer software. Plagiarism and other forms of cheating involve both lying and stealing and are violations of ORU's Honor Code: "I will not cheat or plagiarize; I will do my own academic work and will not inappropriately collaborate with other students on assignments." Plagiarism is usually defined as copying someone else's ideas, words, or sentence structure and submitting them as one's own. Other forms of academic dishonesty include (but are not limited to) the following:
 - a. Submitting another's work as one's own or colluding with someone else and submitting that work as though it were his or hers;
 - b. Failing to meet group assignment or project requirements while claiming to have done so;
 - c. Failing to cite sources used in a paper;
 - d. Creating results for experiments, observations, interviews, or projects that were not done:
 - e. Receiving or giving unauthorized help on assignments.

By submitting an assignment in any form, the student gives permission for the assignment to be checked for plagiarism, either by submitting the work for electronic verification or by other means. Penalties for any of the above infractions may result in disciplinary action including failing the assignment or failing the course or expulsion from the University, as determined by department and University guidelines.

- 4. Final exams cannot be given before their scheduled times. Students need to check the final exam schedule before planning return flights or other events at the end of the semester.
- 5. Students are to be in compliance with University, school, and departmental policies regarding the Whole Person Assessment requirements. Students should consult the Whole Person Assessment handbooks for requirements regarding general education and the students' majors.
 - a. The penalty for not submitting electronically or for incorrectly submitting an artifact is a zero for that assignment.
 - b. By submitting an assignment, the student gives permission for the assignment to be assessed electronically.

2. Attendance

- a. The last day for students to add nursing classes is the first Monday following the University's date for the beginning of classes.

Understand that 3 tardies equal an unexcused absence and excessive absences (approved or unapproved) will deny credit for the course. Tardy is defined as arriving to class late or leaving class before dismissed without prior approval from instructor.

- c. The Dean of the College of Nursing may request administrative excuses for absences from courses or Chapel when scheduling conflicts exist with scheduled learning experiences within the College of Nursing.
- d. Students are to discuss administratively excused absences with the course coordinator and confirm plans for meeting course objectives 48 business hours *prior to* the scheduled class.
- e. Makeup of modular posttests is arranged only in the case of an excused class absence. Students *must speak personally* to the course coordinator *prior to* the test period if they are unable to take a scheduled exam. Absences are excused only for cases of documented illness or other crisis situations. Students must pay a \$15 fee, payable to student accounts, for a late exam.
- f. All pre-assignments must be completed prior to attending a learning experience. Failure to complete a pre-assignment will result in a student being dismissed from the experience. The dismissal will count as an unexcused absence.

Engagement is a primary component of a concept-based curriculum. Participation and engagement in all learning experiences is required. Failure to participate or engage appropriately during a learning experience4 may result in a student being dismissed from the learning experience. The dismissal will count as an unexcused absence

- 3. Clinical Policies
 NUR 300 is not a clinical course. Therefore, clinical policies are not applicable.
- 4. Evaluation Procedures
 - a. Students are **required** to submit all assignments for course completion. Due dates of assignments are specified in the syllabus

or course resources. Submitting assignments in a timely manner or making arrangements in case of emergency demonstrates the student's professional accountability and responsibility.

Assignments submitted late will have points deducted as follows:

1 business day: 10% 2 business days: 20% 3 business days: 30%

4 business days: A grade of zero will be given.

b. Whole Person Assessment requirements:

The College of Nursing, under a University-led initiative, has an electronic portfolio system (ePortfolio) to evaluate students' achievement of academic outcomes. Therefore, all nursing majors are required to prepare an electronic portfolio. Each student is responsible for submitting ePortfolio artifacts as described in course syllabi.

- 1. Evaluation Procedures
 - a. Evaluation is based on achievement of stated course objectives. Evaluation tools include quizzes and a comprehensive physical examination of an individual. The course grade for NUR 300 is based upon work in the following areas:

- c. Written assignments and other course work are due as specified in the syllabus addendum. Submitting assignments in a timely manner, or making arrangements in case of emergency, demonstrates the student's professional accountability and responsibility. Late assignments will result in a grade deduction of 10% per business day on the total possible points for each assignment.
- d. Clinical laboratory performance is not graded on a weekly basis, but attendance is required. The laboratory experience culminated in a performance of a physical exam including a hands-on demonstration of the designated skills and appropriate written documentation. A student is required to achieve both a 70% or better score on the demonstration of the physical exam and 70% or more on the written documentation in order to pass the course.
