Syllabus for

MUS 001—Applied Music (Piano)

1 Credit hour Spring 2024

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

One 25-minute applied lesson per week.

Prerequisite: Department approval.

Applied Lesson Fee for non-music majors: \$250 per semester

Instrument Use Fee: \$55 per semester

II. COURSE GOALS

This course is designed to help the student develop a high standard of piano performance in solos, ensembles and accompaniments.

VII. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- B. Course Policies and Procedures
 - 1. Evaluation
 - a. Each student will receive a piano critique sheet at each lesson that will give a progress analysis, assignment, and lesson grade. Each unexcused absence will lower the final grade by one letter grade (e.g. from A to B). Three unexcused absences will result in an automatic F for the course. If students contact the instructor previous to an unexcused absence, the lesson may or may not be made up at the instructor's discretion. If an instructor misses a lesson, the lesson will be made up at a mutually agreeable time.
 - b. Weekly grades are based on the following requirements:
 - 1. Sight-reading new solo and ensemble compositions.
 - 2. Technical studies consisting of scales, arpeggios, chord progressions.
 - 3. Researching composers and historical musical styles.
 - 4. Harmonic and formal analysis of assigned repertoire.
 - 5. Long-lined, cantabile phasing; various articulations of legato and staccato; tonal nuances; and correct pedaling.
 - 6. Accuracy of reproducing the composer's intentions.
 - 7. Memorizing assigned solos.
 - 8. Studying accompaniments especially related to the student's primary instrument.
 - 9. Developing improvisational skills.
 - 10. Weekly grades are averaged at the end of the semester.
 - c. A final jury will be held during the week before final exams at which the student will perform by memory one solo selected by mutual agreement of the student and teacher from the literature studied during the semester.

This performance must be given to receive a passing grade for the semester. Makeup juries must be prearranged.

- d. Whole Person Assessment Requirements
 There are no WPA requirements for this course
- e. Other Policies and/or Procedures

 The students must notify the professor in advance if it becomes necessary for them to be absent. Two or more unexcused absences will cause a student to be dropped from the class. Excused absences must be made up at a time specified by the professor.
