Syllabus for

MUS 086 — Jazz Combo

1 Credit hour Spring 2024

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Performance ensembles which are designed to rehearse and perform music especially created for small ensembles of instrumentalists.

Prerequisite: Audition for the director with sufficient technical ability and musicality. Ensemble Fee: \$40.00

II. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES FOR THIS COURSE

As a result of successfully completing this course, the student will be able to do the following:

- A. Perform prepared jazz pieces in at least one semester concert.
- B. Present jazz works in a performance setting with proficiency, enthusiasm and professionalism.
- C. Learn to be fluid in performances, dealing with unexpected circumstances, errors in performance, or other issues that tend to surface in concert situations
- D. Contribute constructive ideas that shape the final performance of some selected jazz works, demonstrating the ability to work in conjunction with other band members to develop interpretations unique to the group.
- E. Gradually build a vocabulary of jazz chords and appropriate voicings for those chords (according to instrument played).
- F. Learn basic techniques for improvisation, including scalar, motivic, pattern and variation.
- G. Musically replicate professional or semi-professional performances of existing jazz works.
- H. Play multiple styles within the genre of jazz with stylistic accuracy. Styles to be selected from include: standards, latin, funk, gospel, blues, blues-rock, rhythm and blues, smooth, cool and modern
- I. Create fresh interpretations/arrangements of jazz pieces, experimenting with form and structure, reharmonization and style.
- J. Learn good rehearsal techniques for small groups and provide input on means for improvement in the areas of musicianship and stage presence.
- K. Evaluate performances of other jazz combos and provide productive feedback.
