Syllabus for

MUS 032 – Applied Music (Harp)

2 Credit Hour Spring 2024

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students will receive a weekly 60-minute harp lesson, scheduled at a time mutually agreed upon. During the lessons the student will perform prepared materials as well as receive constructive criticism and instruction for the next assignment. Assignments are given according to background and ability. Between lessons it is expected that the student will pursue a daily practice schedule using the techniques and practice tools learned in lessons. The student is responsible for acquiring assigned music.

Applied Lesson Fee: \$500.00 for non-majors.

Instrument Use Fee: \$55.00 for non-majors if the University harp is used for practice and

performance.

Two semesters of Applied Harp – MUS 006

One year of private harp study

Two years of private piano study

By audition. If the student is auditioning for a music scholarship, they should follow the audition requirements that will be demonstrate their abilities, i.e. the published audition requirements for non-music majors, Bachelor of Music Education, or Bachelor of Music.

VII. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

- B. Course Policies and Procedures
 - 1. Attendance and Practice
 - a. Lesson Cancellation Policy I will make up your lesson if you cancel BEFORE the day of your lesson and if it's for an illness or written university-excused absence. No makeups will be made for no-shows, tardiness, personal accommodations, should you cancel at the last minute, or if you cancel to take an early vacation day, a trip, or other personal reasons that do not have a written university excuse. If I have to cancel a lesson, I will make it up.

- b. Professor can potentially lower the lesson grade for the following, depending upon the circumstances:
 - 1) Failure to call at least 1 hour in advance of any absence will result in a failing grade for that lesson.
 - 2) No lesson will be rescheduled because of failure to prepare assignments, no-shows, tardiness, personal accommodations, should you cancel at the last minute, cancel to take an early vacation day, a trip, or other personal reasons that do not have a written university excuse.
 - 3) "Lessons missed through student carelessness will not be made up except with the approval of the instructor."
 - 4) If a lesson time conflicts with activities classified as an excused absence (Music Department sponsored trips and absences approved by the registrar) or illness, an alternate time must be arranged at least 24 hours in advance by calling, texting, or emailing the professor. The professor reserves the right to request a written statement from the school health center of the student's physician confirming any medical condition.

Failure to adhere to these attendance and music preparation policies can affect the student's grade if the professor believes there to be a conflict with the excuse given or if there are repeated offenses.

- c. **Practice Requirements** Student is expected to practice, **DAILY**, 1 hour per credit hour taken +30 minutes per credit hour (or 0 hour) for every university ensemble that he/she is enrolled in. A **daily practice record** is to be kept. The record should show the date and the amount of time spent that day practicing.
- d. Music Preparation

Students have 1 week, between lessons, to prepare the music with required pedal markings or transferred markings. **Mindfulness and accuracy** of how the markings are transferred will be graded.

Students have 1 week, between lessons, to order and receive assigned music.

e. Listening References

Approved recordings of the current music that is being studied are required.

f. GRADING

Students are graded on practice record, attendance, attitude, improvement, and music jury performance.

g. Miscellaneous Studio Requirements and Information

Every student is responsible for his/her own music purchase. Music must be in the lesson no later than 2 weeks from assignment.

Wash your hands before each lesson and each practice session. If you have a fever, stay home. The harp studios are for harp practice and lessons only. Only harp students of chamber ensemble members are permitted in the room.

Only water bottles are allowed in the studio. No food please!

Personal grooming should be done in the bathroom. It doesn't take long for hair to accumulate on the carpet which gets on the pedals and inside the harp. Hair must be out of the student's face in the lesson and when performing.

Fingernails should be kept short, barely above the quick. Polish should be light in color for performing.

No Jewelry or Watches on wrists, fingers, or dangling earnings.

Dress Code – Modest Clothing ONLY - You are playing an elegant and beautiful instrument. Your clothing should respectfully represent the attitude of the instrument and the instructor.

No clothing with buttons or zippers or any other hardware that could scratch the harp when you have it on your shoulder. NO short shorts, low-cut tops, spaghetti straps or any other clothing that allow your flesh to touch the harp. For sanitary reasons – remember that other people play the same instrument.

Cell Phones – should be on silent or turned off during the lesson Repertoire Research is required for each piece of repertoire studied Due within 2 weeks of assignment of repertoire – failure to meet this deadline will result in a grade drop

A 300 word paragraph for each piece of music studied, detailing the composer and how his/her style is reflected in the music. Details should include era, style, form, harmonies, and expression.

End of semester jury – first semester harp students do not have to play a jury in front of the piano/harp faculty. Your jury will be in the studio on jury week, with the instructor.

1 credit students - 2 memorized pieces (16 measures each) OR 1 memorized piece the length of 2 short memorized pieces
 2 credit, non-majors - 2 memorized pieces (minimum 2 pages each) OR 1 memorized piece the length of 2 shorter memorized pieces
 2 credit, majors - 10 minutes of memorized solo selection(s)

Instrument Maintenance – Be it the school harp or your personal harp, regular maintenance such as tuning, string replacement, and annual maintenance is expected and required.

REQUIRED LIVE PERFORMANCE ATTENDANCE

- 1. **Recital Attendance** each student is required to attend 3 on-campus recitals performed by music faculty or music students. The program from the recital should be presented to Professor Barton soon after the performance.
- 2. **Concert Attendance** -- student is required to attend at least 2 concerts off-

- campus that involves harp. Ex. Tulsa Philharmonic, Signature Symphony, Tulsa Oratorio, Church performances that are not part of a regular worship service, etc.
- 3. On-Campus Performance -- each student is required to perform in solo at least one solo piece for memory in Music Performance Class if you are enrolled
- 4. Whole Person Assessment Requirements

 Copies of Instrumental Jury Evaluation Sheets, providing repertoire studied and the progress shown for each semester. Selected recordings of performances

(audio and/or video tapes, or CD's) may be included in the artifact.
